

Hall County Sheriff's Office Teen Driving Program Registration Has Been Filled

February 1, 2014

2014 marks the twelfth year that the Sheriff's Office has offered new driver curriculum to Hall County Students. Originally established in 2002 under National Safety Council Defensive Driving guidelines, the program was redesigned in 2007 to encompass a 30 hour classroom component as part of the Georgia's legislation known as "Joshua's Law." The four-day course also involves practical driving exercises involving student participation. The Teen Driver Program is licensed by the State of Georgia Department of Driver Services.

The intent of the course is to introduce a level of instruction that prepares students for both predictable and unpredictable real-world driving situations. Through the combined efforts of our School Resource Unit, students will complete 30 hours of classroom instruction on Joshua's law as well as the A.D.A.P.T. program (Alcohol Drug Awareness Program Training). Both certifications are required prior to a student obtaining his or her license.

Session Four: July 7-10

Session Five: July 21-24

Session Six: July 28-31
