

## **Capt. Frank Sosebee Sworn In As President of Georgia Jail Association**

Frank Sosebee, captain at the Hall County Correctional Institute, has successfully completed Executive Training in Aurora, Colo. at the National Institute of Corrections and has been sworn in as president of the Georgia Jail Association.

"After eight months of extensive training in all areas of executive excellence, I have achieved a goal that I set for myself nearly a year ago," Sosebee said. "Executive excellence prepares those who successfully graduate as future executives in law enforcement. The training I received will be utilized and implemented in the daily operations of Hall County. The National Institute of Corrections prepares executives to become effective at dealing with organizational revolution, which is a sudden, radical or complete change - a basic reorientation. This training requires leaders to provide a distinctive set of strategic directions that transforms their organizations. The theory and research that is instilled into future executives provides effective practices, enabling those executives to confront the challenges of today's dynamic world.

Sosebee becomes the 27th president of the Georgia Jail Association.

"It's an honor and privilege to serve as the president of GJA," said Sosebee, who was sworn in during the association's awards banquet at St. Simon's Island, GA.

The Georgia Jail Association was established in 1987 of those concerned with or interested in the custody and care of persons awaiting trial, serving sentences, or otherwise locally confined, to improve the conditions and systems under which such persons are detained, to instill jail standards established by Georgia sheriffs and present those standards through training, information exchange, programs and services.
